

# What is Group B Strep?

Group B Strep (also called GBS for short) is a type of bacteria that is found in 1 in 4 vaginas.



### Is it dangerous?

It is **not** dangerous for you, but it can give babies a dangerous infection during labor. Your midwife will recommend doing a vaginal-rectal swab between 36 and 37 weeks to check to see if you have it.

## What is the treatment of GBS?

If your Group B Strep swab is positive, your midwife will recommend antibiotics when your labor starts or when your water breaks, whichever comes first. Typically, you get Penicillin through an IV.

# What if treatment is not possible?

- If you're allergic to Penicillin, discuss this with your midwife; there are other medications that can be used instead.
- Often, labor is too fast, and there isn't time for antibiotics. If this happens, your pediatrician may recommend staying in the hospital a little longer to monitor your baby for infection.
- If your baby shows signs of infection, they can be treated with antibiotics.
